Dear Families and friends,

I don't know if you can recall but Monday was a glorious day and then by Tuesday at around 4am it was raining and cold again. What a delight Adelaide weather is, it chops and changes, giving us the best of days to spend outside enjoying God's creation and then times that encourage quiet reflective inside time. I consider myself very lucky to live in Adelaide. I'd like to thank the staff and school board who encourage and support me to undertake professional learning. Last week I attended the South Australian Primary Principals Association conference in the Barossa. I was privileged to listen and learn from three eminent international speakers; Dr George Otero (USA), Dorothy Burt (NZ) and Allan Parker (AUS). The theme of the conference was Learning to Lead. Learning for All. It provided me with the opportunity to learn from the best, to spend time with colleagues to discuss real life issues plus the space to reflect on my practice and our school.

I want to thank you, the school community as a whole, for supporting the school closure days that enable the staff to spend time working together. Unfortunately we had to go to plan b on Monday morning as our presenter (Karen) called in unwell and was unable to share her STEM/Digital Technology expertise with the teaching staff. We diligently discussed what we currently do in these curriculum areas, looked at a fabulous teaching resource and shared practice — a worth-while session where we put another piece in the puzzle of our whole school teaching practice. I will arrange another time for teachers to meet and work with Karen.

The term is steaming ahead already and there is so much on our plate. Planning and providing a quality teaching and learning program is our core business, yet it can often be all the learning around this that children most remember and talk about. You may have noted on the Term 3 School Calendar that we didn't put a Walk-a-thon. In discussion with staff we have decided to link this physical challenge with activities in Phys Ed Week in term four. Our senior students and teachers will work on options and make a recommendation to staff. Our aim is to get children moving and we believe we can do this in many different ways. An example of this is, Megan our Sports Coordinator has booked a sport games specialist to work with teachers and classes later this term. This will broaden the range of games classes can participate in to raise their heartrates as well as the connection!

On Tuesday this week we gathered as a school with the parish to celebrate the Feast of the Assumption. It was a beautiful Mass. The parishioners were very complimentary about the children's behaviour and singing. It's heartening to see some of the youngest and oldest of our community singing and praying together. Thank you to those parents who were able to attend, you are always welcome to join us for our liturgical gatherings. Fr Phillip talked with the children about Mary being Jesus mum and more generally about how special mums are, I wonder if they'll tell you what he said?

Next week we will be engulfed in Book Week. Liz Commane, Kate White and Robyn Grave are creatively transforming the Resource Centre and providing learning opportunities for children and staff focused on literature. It promises to be an exciting and engaging week and of course, like all schools, there will be the Dress Up Parade. Unfortunately I have a Directors Meeting that day so am unable to dress up!!

"Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me, but the One who sent me..." (Mark 9:37, Matthew 18:5, John 13:20)

Road Safety

SAPOL have sent us some road safety reminders and we will providing you with their safety tips in each newsletter for the rest of the year.

Sgt John and Humphrey say - Road Safety around Schools Begins with You



Wearing a seatbelt doubles your chances of surviving a serious crash and nothing else offers the same level of crash protection for children as a properly fitted, approved child restraint. Child restraint laws are based on age (rather than by height or weight) because research indicates that this is easier for parents to follow and will result in the smallest number of children being inappropriately restrained. However, a child's height and weight are still important to consider when making a choice about the right restraint or booster seat for your child.

It is a good idea to keep your child in a restraint with a harness with an antisubmarining seatbelt strap, which is attached to the booster seat and clips to the lap part of the seatbelt (between the child's legs). This prevents a child

from sliding under their seatbelt during a crash or heavy braking. All child restraints must be worn properly, adjusted and securely fastened at all times. The sash part of the seatbelt should sit flat on the shoulder without touching the face or neck. The lap part of the seatbelt should cross low over the hips, not the abdomen. The seatbelt should not be twisted, all slack needs to be removed and the legs of the child should be long enough to hang over the front of the seat when sitting right back.

As seatbelts are designed primarily for adults, a child restraint must be provided until they are able to wear the seatbelt correctly.



Buckle them in every time

Your child needs to be correctly restrained even when travelling a **short distance**. Most crashes happen **close to home!**
