Principal Report - 2022

In this season of Advent, we gather as people of light... this new Church year we hear proclaimed the good news of Christ as proclaimed through the gospel of Matthew. In Matthew's Christmas Narrative, we hear about the star that shines bright and leads the way of the maji to the king of kings... Tonight I would like to invite us all to think about how our year - 2022 has been a shining light that has pointed always to God's love revealed through our staff, students and you our community....

Tonight our 5-pointed star is how we have lived out our 5 Ls... each one is a united part of how we have shined bright through what I am going to say was the joy and challenges of 2022... Each one of us has shone, just like the Star of St Dominic that sits on the top of our school crest. We have not only shined as individual stars but have become and are a constellation of hope, love, and brilliance...

Listen - we started the year having to listen to the government requirements of starting 2022 like no other - our reception and year 1 students would begin school on-site with the rest of our grades engaged in online learning... And how amazing did our staff listen to the call and before you could say Stuart was in his first week of close contact isolation staff got together and made learning packs, still held meet family the family chats through teams and got ready to ensure it was the best possible start. By the first afternoon of the 2022 school year we had welcomed our new receptions, got everyone connected through teams and Marantha studios was up and running each day. We welcomed the Australian uphill snowboarding champion and we all worked to consider our one word for 2022... Last week I was so blessed to work with each class and ask them again what their word for this year and was so touched at the thoughtful and wise responses. We have listened to each other in mentoring moments, in the yard, in the classroom and they have even listened to Mr Baker at times... although as one Yr 6 told me... you do seem to interrupt our learning when you visit. We have listened to the cries of earth and humanity through considered action including re-cycling, purple day in term 1, vinnies – not much sleep out, PJ day and the generous giving tonight for vinnies. We have focused this year as a staff on the place of scripture in prayer and RE and hope our learning helps our students listen to and learn about these important stories in our Tradition and how they can guide us and form us to be leaders for the world God desires... I am so appreciative to the ways you our community listened to covid requirements and with care did what was required to ensure continuity of learning but also safety for each other...

Love – It was fitting that all our students returned back to school after the lock down start in term 1 on Valentine's Day and we loved having we love you on the front gate to welcome everyone back... We have been blessed that love has been the way shared so often in so many amazing ways. Only a couple of weeks ago Sundown showed how your love can shine out and we thank Anna and the whole amazing Sundown team for their work. In Term 2 - I won't say I necessarily liked the mask requirements or having to

do RAT tests or filling in spreadsheets for SA Health and sending out the ever-changing covid management requirements. But I loved the way our staff, students and community showed their love to each other. I have loved the cape ceremonies in early years which highlight students living out the key capabilities and being able to recognize these qualities in others. I have loved the warm welcomes each morning and excited sharing of learning and personal growth. We have loved welcoming our Little Ants and each and every student this year. I have loved being able to join a class for prayer – planned so beautifully by class teachers and attend excursions, events and experiences. Thank you to our staff who have developed amazing learning experiences and supported them across each learning areas, connected to each capability and so much more. Above the National Average in every aspect of NAPLAN for Year 3 and huge growth in Yr 5 NAPLAN. Above state average in Year 4 RE, sensational personal growth for so many in so many ways. Learning to spray paint, draw and color thanks to the support of our P&F through our Artist in Residence Program. Thank you to our staff who have embraced learning and personal development in so many ways including in Writing, ICT, embracing our online student management system, student agency, focus on high achievers, growth mindset and wellbeing. One special celebration is passed on to Mr Georgiou who has been recognized through a rigorous cross-sector process as a highly accomplished teacher inline with the Australian Teacher Standards – congratulations.

Lead – I was graced when our Yr 6 students shined as beautiful leaders on our kindy visits and in mentoring moments each week. The tears when there were more Yr 3 students than little ants and some people would not get a buddy – but the way you all cared for our little treasures. Students - For the ways you have led in the yard and helped out, in the classroom and strived for excellence and how you have shined bright as STARS. For our eco-warriors who just tell me to get out of the way and get on with shining bright through their care for creation. To our garden ants who take time to work with Ms D to garden and care and grow just as much as the plants. For the ways students are buddies to each other in formal and informal settings – thankyou for leading with care and love. Year 2 students planning outdoor learning activities, Yr 6 reading buddies, Year 4/5 and Reception prayer buddies. I would like to thank Monica for her leadership lived out in so many ways. To Joh Kohler and the whole school board, Tim and Lynn on Finance, to all of you our official P&F and in a special way Anna, Bernice and Laura for their key roles. Thankyou. To our Yr 6's who have shined

To Brooke and the OSHC crew, to our visiting relief teachers, volunteers, helpers and allied health supporters – thankyou. Laugh - I hope when you look back over 2022 you like me have a HUGE smile.... For me our L of Laughter captures the joy and pride of being apart of such an amazing community. CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

St Anthony's Schoolissituated in the inner southern suburb of Edwardstown. It was opened in 1930 by the Dominican Sisters, welcoming families from the local community. St Anthony's is committed to maintaining links with its founding sisters and their charism of welcoming all to our community. We strive to keep their motto, Veritas (Truth) at the core of our vision; *Growing in Faith Building Knowledge Working for Justice*.

The vision of St Anthony's School is to be a place where learners are inspired to be creative, take risks, inquire and build their social, emotional, spiritual, physical and intellectual capabilities. The values by which we live are: **We Learn, We Love, We Listen, We Laugh and We Lead**

We are a learning community where children develop skills and competencies that will enable them to thrive and succeed in life and in doing so become leaders working for the common good.

Our educational vision is based on the following teaching and learning pedagogy:

Authentic

Authentic learning involves real life problem-solving activities allowing multiple perspectives and ways of learning, it challenges and engages learning.

Creative

Creative learning enhances originality, innovation and imagination in both teaching and learning.

Reflective

Reflective practice involves critical thinking, being open to change and an emphasis on reviewing to improve.

Collaborative

A collaborative environment involves working together to achieve a common goal, where accountability and equity are shared.

We offer flexible learning spaces that provide excellent learning opportunities with contemporary pedagogies and digital technologies. Specialist programs including Music, Japanese and Physical Education. The school has a vibrant OSHC facility (that offers Vacation Care). We employ a Chaplain to enhance our Catholic Identity and support children and familie wellbeing. Our Inclusive Education Coordinator works with staff, children and families to accommodate children with special needs. Whole school celebrations include St Anthony's Feast Day, Sports Day, Book Week and Purple Day. A strong focus on Outdoor learning is supported through the physical structures of our spaces, including a purpose-built nature play area, Butterfly garden and Veggie / Garden Patches.

TEACHER STANDARDS AND QUALIFICATIONS AT ST. ANTHONY'S SCHOOL

In our school, we are very fortunate to have teachers committed to lifelong learning. The breakdown of the qualifications of the teaching and education support staff is:

All staff are supported in working towards their goals, including access to high quality professional learning.

Staff are committed to professional learning and embrace the notion of continuous improvement.

Our whole school staff participated in several professional learning opportunities on Pupil Free Days and during Staff Meetings. These included:

All teaching staff have a set of documented and regularly reviewed goals and are supported in working towards their goals through access to high quality professional learning.

WORKFORCE COMPOSITION

For 2022, there were 9.0 FTE teaching staff members and our total teaching staff numbers were 14 (made up of 10 females and 4 male teachers). Our staff attendance rate for 2022 was 92%.

There were 21 non-teaching staff members (4 male and 17 females) employed which included 8.3 FTE. These included our Out of School Hours Care Program and we had 5 instrumental tutors working in our Instrumental Program every week.

KEY STUDENT OUTCOMES

1. STUDENT ATTENDANCE

The total number of student enrolments in 2022 was 140. The average student attendance rate for our school in 2022 was:

The percentage of Indigenous enrolments was 2.18% and the percentage of students with disabilities was 17%.

It is an expectation that parents inform the school when their child is absent from school by telephoning between 8.30am and 9:00am, and sending the class teacher a note explaining the absence on the student's return. School attendance is monitored by classroom teachers and absences are recorded daily on our student system ceSIS, and reports are produced each term. In the event that a high level of unexplained absences is recorded, the parent/caregiver is notified and the class teacher informed accordingly. Should this continue without any explanation, then a member of the Leadership Team is contacted and the school will inform Child Abuse Report Line (CARL).

2. STUDENT OUTCOMES IN STANDARDISED NATIONAL LITERACY AND NUMERACY (NAPLAN) TESTING AT ST ANTHONY'S SCHOOL IN 2022.

One hundred percent (100%) of the Year 3 & 5 students achieved the National Minimum stand in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy.

Analyzing the NAPLAN results show consistent improvement in <u>all</u> areas of the NAPLAN test. The curriculum areas that showed the greatest improvement were Numeracy and Spelling.

The Year 3 students do not have a comparison for their cohort as 2022 was the first year they had sat the NAPLAN.

Teachers analyse the NAPLAN data and compare the scores to the PAT Math & PAT Reading tests performed by students Term 4. This will assist the staff identify areas where student support is required.

All were done in consultation with the APRIM (Assistant Principal – Religious Identity and Mission). Fr Phillip is our Parish Priest and is the President of our School Board. ☐ **Mission Efforts**: Every term, there is a whole school Mission Effort for a Social Justice initiative. These include Caritas, St Vincent De Paul, Soup Group for Hutt Street, Catholic Charities and Catholic Missions. • St Anthony's Feast Day: Our annual celebration gives us the opportunity to celebrate our Patron Saint's day with a Whole School Mass. St Anthony's offered the following programs for the benefit of the students in our care: ☐ Inclusive Education Program: funded support for students with identifiable learning disabilities. ☐ Out of School Hours Care Program (OSHC): a nationally accredited service providing before and after school care for approximately 50 students. Our Program is operated by qualified staff and is opened for Vacation Care every school break. We continue to be recognised with an Exceeding Rating. • Premier's Reading Challenge: in 2022, another very successful year for our school whereby almost 95% of students were involved in the program, which was recognised with St Anthony's being presented with an award from the state Premier. ☐ Gardening Club: students from different year levels work with the groundsman in maintaining the different gardens around the school. ☐ **Music Tuition:** students are able to learn a variety of instruments with trained musicians in purpose build instrumental rooms Out of school sport: students are able to participate in many sports out of school hours through the coordination of the Sport teacher and generosity of parent volunteers **Music Program:** The fundamental part of the Music Program at St Anthony's comprised of weekly 40 minute class music lessons. Throughout the year, all students were involved in a wide range of musical activities including singing, playing instruments, moving, and listening, reading and composing music. Many students were also involved in elective music groups, which rehearsed and performed during the year. These included: ☐ **Festival Choir**: The choir trained throughout the first three terms to perform at the Catholic Schools Music Festival in September at the Entertainment Centre ☐ The Private Instrumental Program: involving 6 tutors, continued with about 38 students participating each week. It involved a wide range of instruments including piano, guitar,

voice, drums, and violin.

2022 Sports and Physical Activity Opportunities:

Physical activity opportunities for students at St Anthony's School are a significant part of encouraging fun, positive experiences to promote lifelong physical activity for our students. In addition to their Physical Education lessons, the students have opportunities to participate in a number of in-school time sporting events and carnivals. St Anthony's School is a member and supporter of the South Australian Primary Schools Amateur Sports Association (SAPSASA), the South Australian Catholic Primary School Sports Association (SACSPSA) and the Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation (ACHPER SA).

Japanese Program:

Term One was devoted to getting to know students, staff and the school. This linked in well with the Semester 1 Japanese program, as students in all year levels practiced greetings and self-introductions, ranging from simply saying 'hello' and 'good bye' in reception to being able to answer simple questions about themselves in Year 5.

Students explored Japanese culture through making Daruma dolls and koinobori (carp kites) and other craft activities centered around 'Kodomo no hi' (Children's Day). They also practiced counting and following classroominstructions in Japanese.

All students had a chance to demonstrate what they had learnt in Japanese in one to one interviews in term 2. Years 4 and 5 students were given the extra challenge of having a short conversation in Japanese, answering the questions "How are you? What is your name?" and "How old are you?".

Term 3 marked the beginning of a new Semester and new topics for all year level groups. In Reception/ Year 1, we welcomed the new students, revised some basic greetings from Semester 1 and began learning about animals and colours. Students in 2/3 classes worked hard to learn the names and colours of the animals from the story "Brown Bear". Students in some classes were also introduced to Japanese Summer Festivals and made paper lanterns.

Year 4/5 students began a topic on "what's in my school bag?" naming stationary items we use at school and asking each other politely for objects in the classroom. To tie in with the Year of Mercy, students in Years 4/5 also examined the kanji (Japanese characters) for the words 'mercy' and 'peace' and created lanterns with these words written in Japanese.

Reception/ year 1 students practiced their song to share at the Japanese Cultural afternoon. Students in Years 2/3 finished their animal and colour flip books and demonstrating their knowledge through individual aural assessments.

Year 4/5 students completed their mini "What's in my bag" story books, writing all the target vocabulary in Japanese. Their final task being to read their books to me individually. It was positive to see that students understood the language for classroom objects in Japanese, so more target language can now be used in class.

The year ended with a wonderful celebration, our first Japanese Cultural afternoon. All classes enjoyed playing some Japanese games and activities and some classes demonstrated what they had learned throughout the year at the Japanese/Drama assembly. It was wonderful to see how the community embraced this event, with many families making the effort to bring Japanese themed 'bentos' or lunch boxes and dress in Japanese colours and clothing. The hope is that this will become a regular event on the St Anthony's school calen

PARENT, STUDENT AND TEACHER SATISFACTION WITH THE SCHOOL

Parents, staff and students were involved the LLL Surveys which gives us information about how we perform as a Catholic School (Catholic Ethos), the teaching and learning programs we currently offer, opportunities for students to grow and develop, communication strategies used to relay information to you, and facilities utilised to deliver a quality education. In addition to this the Strategic Plan captures the key capabilities associated with thinking, learning and leading in a rapidly changing and complex world.




Figure 1: Catholic Education South Australia, *Towards 2027: Expanding Horizons and Deepening Practices,* (February 2022), Page 3.

- 7.1 Ensure our vision, culture, practices, learning and faith formation experiences are embedded and driven by our Catholic Faith and Dominican Charism.
- 7.2 Create an excellent educational environment which matters deeply to our staff, students and their families and wider community.
